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Wild Horse Race Country

The Warm Springs Reservation is Wild Horse Race Country. A recent example:

Two generations of Warm Springs horse racers each won Championships at the March competition of the Professional Wild Horse Racers Association.

The Jason Smith Team won the over 18 division. This was to be expected, as the Jason Smith Team is best Wild Horse Racing team in the nation, and has been for several years.

The winner of the 13-18 year division was the newly-formed Florendo Team of Warm Springs, with team members Preston Stevens, Koedy Florendo and Carlos Estrada.

A Professional Wild Horse Race Team consists of three people, called the shankman, the mugger and the rider. The equipment used is a lead shank, halter and saddle.

All of the positions are equally difficult and physical. On the Florendo Team, Koedy is the shankman, Carlos is the mugger, and Preston the rider.

happens fast, and can be dangerous, as the animals are wild. The action happens in a rodeo arena with eight teams competing against each other.

When the whistle blows the muggers open the gates and the horses

come running and bucking out of the chutes.

The shankman has to stop his team's animal. The shankman holds the horse in a position so the mugger can move up the shank and grab

the horse by the halter.

The next moment the rider gets the saddle on the horse and secures it by the quick cinch.

Strategic milestone for John Day fish restoration

The John Day River is the third longest free-flowing river in the Lower 48, and there is no fish hatchery on this river, so all of the fish are wild.

This means the John Day is ideal for fish restoration, said Brian Cochran, restoration ecologist with the Branch of Natural Resources. "If we can't restore fish here, then where?" he says.

The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs take the lead role in

fish restoration in the John Day, the eastern edge of the Ceded Lands.

Over the past several years, many agencies and districts have been involved in hundreds of John Day restoration projects.

But in the basin, the tribes are involved, to some degree or another, in all of them. By way of analogy: "The tribes are like the quarterback, with their hand on the ball on every play," said Scott Turo, Natural Resources fish biologist.

The tribes own restoration lands along the river. They started with Pine Creek Ranch near Clarno in 1998. Then came the Oxbow Ranch on the Middle Fork in 2001; and the Forrest Ranch parcels in 2002.

These conservation areas are now models of land management for salmon habitat recovery. The tribes work with the Bonneville Power Administration on these and other mitigation projects in the John Day.

Natural Resources is nearly finished with the document—the John Day River Watershed Restoration Strategy—that will guide, and help fund the future restoration work in the John Day.

The 95-page strategy—two-years in the making—is ready for review by the Fish and Wildlife Committee, and then will go to Tribal Council for final review and approval.

Travis' show at the museum will feature color paintings plus pen-and-ink drawings, said Natalie Kirk, museum curator.

Quiet Strength opens with a reception on April 9 at 4 p.m., and runs through June 7.

Following the Travis Bobb exhibit will be the 2015 main exhibit at the museum. This will be: *Royal Legacy—Honoring the Miss Warm Springs of Our Past and Present*.

Business planners to graduate

One of the business ideas is to develop mountain bike trails on the reservation, and then rent mountain bikes to visitors.

Another idea is to raise and market organic beef. And another idea is to sell "Tiny Houses."

These are some of the ideas from the Warm Springs Indianpreneurship class. In the current class there are eight to 10 students who will be graduating this week. They have been developing their ideas over the past several weeks with the Indianpreneurship class.

They meet at the Credit Enterprise. Lead teacher is Aurolyn Stwyer, owner of the Red Skye Trading Post, vice-chair of the Jefferson County Chamber of Commerce, and co-author of the Indianpreneurship curriculum and text book.

The business ideas of the current class are excellent, Stwyer says. The mountain bike idea is a good example. Kah-Nee-Ta Village has mountain bike rentals, but this could also work at other locations on the reservation.

Cycling is very popular, as shown by the more than 2,000 riders who passed through the reservation during Cycle Oregon, Stwyer said.

"That had a major economic impact on several businesses in the region," she said. The Tiny House and organic beer ideas are also excellent, Stwyer said.

The Indianpreneurship graduation is this Thursday, April 2, at the Credit Enterprise. All are invited to stop by around 6 p.m. to congratulate the graduates, and to learn more about the program.

Letters to the editor

Complete editions of the *Spilyay Tymoo* from 1986 through 2005 are now available online. Anyone interested can browse these editions by date.

The site also has a keyword or phrase search function. So you can locate a particular article or picture, clip the item electronically, and print it or keep it digitally on your computer.

The online site hosting the old *Spilyay* editions is that of the Historic Oregon Newspapers, where you can find back issues from many newspapers in the state. Their website is:

oregonnews.uoregon.edu
From that site go to ‘Titles’ and find the *Spilyay Tymoo* in the alphabetical listing. The little calendar icon takes you to a calendar view of the available issues.

Keyword search
If you want to do a keyword search, click the ‘Search’ tab on the Oregon Historic Newspapers home page. This will take you to the search page.

In the ‘Select Newspaper’ box, again the titles are listed alphabetically: Scroll down to *Spilyay Tymoo*.

Then enter keywords in whichever search box makes sense.

For a phrase, or a first and last name together, the recommendation is the last box. This will search the words “within 5 words of each other” for the most accurate results.

When you are looking at a particular page of interest, the buttons in the grey bar at the top of the viewer allow you to zoom in and out. You can use the little blue scissor icon in the top right corner to clip an article or image—a new tab will open, and you can save to your computer or print.

The *Spilyay* online project was made possible by a grant through the Digital Scholarship Center at the University of Oregon Libraries. Sheila Rabun, digital project manager at the University of Oregon Library, coordinated the effort.

The next step in the *Spilyay* online project is to post the remaining editions, from the first one in 1976 through early 2014. The spring 2014-to-present editions are available at the website: wsnews.org

Meanwhile, the 1986-2005 editions make for some good browsing—you might want to check it out.

Memories with a rich flavor of character

As I look back... the noise of cattle in the corral during cattle ride season, the smell of baked yeast bread and huckleberry pies from a wood cook stove, the sound of 30 children raised within the walls of this ranch home, the echo of a farming tractor driven by Ida McKinley after a full day’s work as Tribal Court Judge.

I envision Maxine McKinley when she was brought to Warm Springs from Celilo Falls after the passing of her mother when Maxine was the tender age of 6 or 7 years old in 1931, with her three sisters, Bessie McKinley Eder, Cecelia McKinley Frank and Virginia McKinley, to be raised by Isaac and Ida McKinley.

Maxine was born on April 30, 1925 to Charlie McKinley and Annie Jim McKinley. Their home was in the rimrocks of Celilo Falls, where a rich traditional lifestyle was the family’s custom and way of life. In Central Oregon, Maxine would go dig roots, pick huckleberries and pick potatoes at a ranch in Powell Butte (Sidney Carter and family).

Charlie and Isaac McKinley fished at Celilo Falls with Chief Tommy Thompson on Chief’s Island, as Traditional custom to share and feed the people at feast time, funerals and other customary purposes.

Maxine got her education at Warm Springs Boarding School and at Chemawa Indian School. Her working career consisted of “over 50 years of Janitorial/Custodian

commitment,” cleaning the tribal administration building, Tribal Court, the school, the Warm Springs Police Department and Natural Resources building. Other employment she held was in Tectronix and as a lookout worker. She worked until recently, when she was forced to retire around 75 years old.

Maxine had two children: Alexander Tohet and Teresa McKinley. She helped raise many foster children in a two-room home up along Highway 3.

Maxine could be heard singing loud as she was in the kitchen canning vegetables, deer meat and fruits. She spent many hours sewing and making school clothes for many children: underclothes, shirts, pants and dresses.

Maxine enjoyed her skills of beadwork and many traditional crafts she learned as

a young child.

Today you go to her home and she will be washing her clothes by hand, while her washing machine sets motionless and quiet.

She is to be honored for her contributions of many years of commitment. She holds a personality and character that is soft and gentle. When she meets anyone along her way she offers a word of encouragement and hope.

Maxine will be 90-91 years old in April. You ask her, “What gave her a long enjoyable and comfortable life?” She will tell you the spiritual strength and belief she holds, and all her family that embrace and lover her dearly.

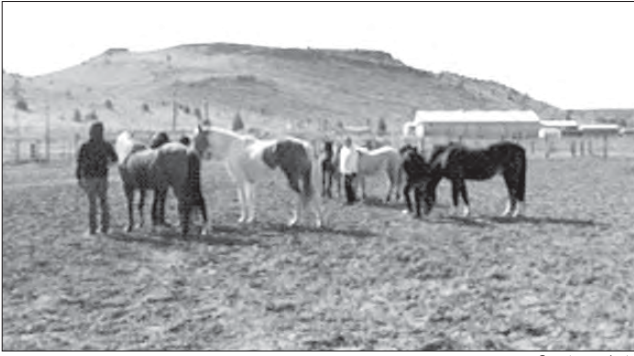
4-H is strengthening its presence in Warm Springs once again.

The document will help with obtaining millions more in funding for future projects, Cochran said.

The tribes approach the John Day as four separate sub-basins: The Lower John Day, the North Fork, the Middle Fork, and the Upper John Day.

The restoration strategy addresses each sub-basin in its own chapter, describing the geography and geology, land-use, the creeks, and the use by the fish of each sub-basin.

The strategy examines the biggest obstacles to healthy

fish populations in each of the sub-basins; and how particular restoration actions could address these obstacles. As summarized in the document:

“The John Day Watershed Restoration Strategy is written for John Day basin landowners, tribal partners, and potential funders to proactively identify and fund projects that protect, manage and restore fish habitat. This habitat supports culturally significant fish populations, ensuring harvest opportunities for the tribal membership forever.”

"I was exceptionally well trained in my understanding of the sciences by Nick Kezele...I found all of my teachers at MHS exceptionally talented and dedicated...Walt Ponsford, Matt Henry, Steve Hillis, and Steve Rankin really challenged us to think and analyze rather than just memorize in subjects such as English, History and Civics. I still even use lessons taught to me by Colleen Fletcher and Irene Conroy when I write a manuscript and make figures. The fundamentals that these teachers provided me with have served me well as I have progressed in my career."

Dr. Neilson lives in Houston with his wife and five-month-old baby. In his spare time, he enjoys movies, playing soccer, and snowboarding.
