## 2025 FALL SEASON TRIBAL FISHERY ANNOUNCEMENT

Tuesday, August 12, 2025

The Four Columbia River Tribes set the following fishery plan, and the Columbia River Compact has concurred:

## **Commercial Gillnet Fishery**

Area: Zone 6

Dates/Times: 6:00 AM Monday, August 18 to 6:00 PM Thursday, August 21 (3-nights)

6:00 AM Monday August 25 to 6:00 PM Saturday, August 30 (5-nights)

6:00 AM Monday September 1 to 6:00 PM Saturday, September 6 (5-nights)

Gear: Set and Drift Gillnets with an 8-inch Minimum Mesh size Restriction

**Sanctuaries**: Standard river mouth and dam closed areas applicable to gillnet gear, including the standard sanctuary at Spring Creek Hatchery is in effect for all three openings.

Allowable Sales: Salmon (any species) may be sold or kept for subsistence. Shad, yellow perch, bass, walleye, catfish and carp may also be sold or retained for subsistence. Fish landed during the open periods are allowed to be sold after the period concludes. Sturgeon may not be sold, but sturgeon from 38 to 54 inches fork length in the Bonneville Pool and sturgeon from 43 to 54 inches fork length in The Dalles and John Day Pools and may be kept for subsistence purposes.
